**Use of Incense** The use of incense has been part of both Jewish and Christian worship. Incense has two purposes: First, it gives praise and honour and reverence to God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Second, it symbolizes our prayers raising to God; it also symbolizes our sanctification and purification in the sight of God and allowing the Holy Spirit to work in us to make us holy. The incense also reminds us of our heavenly worship. It invites us to pray and reminds us that our prayers rise up to God, like the smoke from the censer.

At the beginning of Mass the Altar is incensed as a symbol of Christ, the Lamb of God who was offered for our salvation. At the Gospel it honours Christ the Son of God, who speaks the Word of Life. At the Preparation of the Gifts and Altar, the incense symbolizes the union of our offering to that of Christ. The bread and wine symbolize the offerings of the people present. The priest and people are members of the Body of Christ, and so they are incensed along with the gifts and the Altar.
